

PREFECTS' OUTING TO TABIN WILDLIFE RESORT, LAHAD DATU Twelve Prefects led by Bro. Francis and four Staff drove to Tabin, a wildlife sanctuary in the heart of Sabah. The 3D2N adventure was made possible with the goodwill from the Chairman and Management of Tabin.

Each year, among themselves, a number of Students are recommended for Prefects' service and are voted in. Leadership training is given by Bro. Director to prepare them for this responsibility. Prefects' dedication to assist in the smooth running of the Home Programme is recognised and appreciated by the Brothers and Management. Besides technical skills training and general studies (English and IT), Montfort's Youth Development Programme emphases on holistic character formation. It is in the day-today well-run Home Programme that transformation in character in the students takes place.

One may ask exactly what Prefects do to deserve being singled out for this 'reward'? In most people's mind, Prefects are like Class Monitors who help Teachers clean the whiteboards and keep the class quiet while the teacher is out of the classroom.

In MYTC. Prefects are tasked with many leadership roles and they are the 'right-hand' men, so to speak, of the Student Affairs Officer. Each morning, at 5.30am a Prefect does the 'wake-up' call, conducts morning exercise and takes roll calls to check on attendance.

In MYTC, we create an environment of a 'Home away from Home' to give Youth a sense of belonging, treating the Centre as their own Home. We do not hire helpers to do chores around the Home. Prefects are the ones who see to it that house-keeping, general maintenance, compound cleaning and kitchen duties are divided and equally shared out. Prefects help to maintain discipline through the 'Merit-card' points system. Indiscipline or misconduct will result in the hard earned merit points being deducted.

In MYTC, English, being a business language, is taught under General Studies along with Computer Studies. Thus, speaking English is enforced. The Prefects' job is to ensure that this is being practised consistently. Employers are generally very impressed with our Students' English proficiency. After leaving MYTC, frequently they wrote back to tell of their gratitude that such vigilance had 'forced' them to master the speaking of English and how much it is helping them in their workplace.

Prefects also organise morning and evening prayers, and carry out week-end projects such as landscaping and grass-cutting at the new Kinarut Campus.

For all of the above, The Management salute our Prefects and a small 'reward' is perfectly justifiable. Prefects serve and give of their time selflessly because it is in doing that they learn to become leaders in the true sense.


On the trip to Tabin, the Prefects have this to share:
